Contemporary railroads such as Norfolk Southern also have historical societies. The CSX Historical Society is in the process of starting up and is already planning their first convention.

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

# DIVISION 8 SPONSORED TRIP TO ENTERTRAINMENT JUNCTION AND TOWER A BUS TOUR, SATURDAY NOVEMBER 5, 2011 Featuring:

## EnterTrainment Junction, WEST CHESTER OHIO (CINCINNATI)

This model railroad attraction bills itself as the World's Largest indoor, interactive model train display with 90 large scale trains (1,200 cars), two miles of track, detailed cities, towns, villages, factories and more. The display has hundreds of bridges, trestles, and tunnels with 16 foot high mountains taking up over 25,000 sq. ft. We will also be taking the VIP Backstage Tour.

## TOWER "A" CINCINNATI UNION TERMINAL

In its day Tower A controlled the movements of 216 daily passenger trains to and from the mainlines, through the track throats, and along the platforms of Cincinnati Union Terminal. Tower "A" was somewhat similar to the control tower of one of today's airports. Today the tower overlooks CSX's and Norfolk Southern's Cincinnati yard facilities. The tower has been restored by the Cincinnati Railroad Club, and features a museum of how the tower operated as well as an extensive railroad library. NOTE: Tower "A" is NOT handicapped accessible, you must be able go up and down steps.

**THE PLAN:** We will board our tour bus in front of Scale Reproductions Hobby Shop, 3073 Breckinridge Lane, Louisville, Kentucky. The bus will leave promptly at 8:30 AM for the two hour trip to EnterTrainment Junction. We will spend approximately three hours there. This should allow for time to tour the railroad, take the backstage tour, have lunch, and visit the gift shop.

Lunch will be on your own at the Junction Café on a scenic patio overlooking a 1930s town square. Hot dogs, nacho's, chicken nuggets, pizza, sandwiches and beverages are available.

We will then continue to Cincinnati for our visit to Tower "A". We will spend approximately one hour at Tower "A" and Cincinnati Union Terminal arriving back at Scale Reproductions at approximately 5:30 PM.

**COST: \$ 32 per person** We have reserved a 36 passenger bus. Get your payment in early to insure a seat. We need your payment as soon as possible so we can reserve the bus (we will not reserve a bus without a minimum of 20 paid reservations.) **Refund Policy: \$ 20 (bus fee) of the cost is non-refundable should you cancel unless the bus or the trip is cancelled.**

## Models at the L & N Historical Society Convention in Harlan, KY.

The Society didn't have a model contest this year, but invited modelers to display their talents. Here is a kit-bashed coal tipple by Jeff Kuebler. Jeff presented a clinic on Kentucky-izing model kits to better represent tipples and company stores typically found in Eastern Kentucky. You can see this clinic on the Division 8 website.



Company Store by Jeff Kuebler. Before the 40's and 50's miners were paid in "company script" rather than money. This script could only be used in company owned stores. "I owe my soul to the company store" was not just a line in a Tennessee Ernie Ford song ("Sixteen Tons").

80 Ton L & N hopper car by Stuart Thayer. Stuart gave a clinic on how to kit-bash these cars from an Atlas Trainman 70 ton hopper car to model the L & N prototype. The process involves removing the existing vertical ribs and fabricating new ones to match the correct spacing. In the case of the 80 ton car, the sides must be raised 6 scale inches.





## L & N Convention Models (continued)

Bob Chapman presented a clinic on modeling the Pan Amerian Consist in 1953-54. Bob described how he kit-bashed cars from different manufacturers to produce the models. Bob has a series of articles appearing in current issues of the L & N Magazine describing how to model L & N Coal Gondolas. If you are not a society member, you can usually find copies for sale on the magazine racks at local hobby shops.




Left. A horse car in the consist. The prototypes were used to transport thoroughbred horses from track to track. As such they were frequent visitors to Louisville.
