FROM THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT



Over the past several years, Bob Dawson and I have organized Operating Session trips to Bob Weinheimer's Pennsylvania Southern layout in Charleston, WV. Because of the overnight sleeping arrangements, we limit the trip to just four people. It's a three-day trip with two days of "op 'til you drop" and as much as 18 hours running trains. Interested in working on your Chief Dispatcher certificate, but having trouble getting enough Dispatcher or Yard Master time? You could completely knock out one of these during a single trip to Bob's layout. Two trips already this year and two more scheduled.

How about Dan Hinel's RailXpress layout on the northeast side of Indianapolis? Dan hosts an operating session almost every week, either on a Wednesday evening or Saturday afternoon. Sometimes, more frequently than that. They're usually 4 hours long, but he's said that if we have someone trying to rack up some time for their dispatcher certificate, we can come early anytime and stay late. The last time we were there, Bruce DeMaeyer contacted Dan ahead of time and said he wanted to become comfortable with the layout's dispatching system. Bruce watched and learned from the regular crew dispatcher for about an hour and the rest of the time he did all the dispatching, with a bit of supervision.

What's the point of all this? There ARE opportunities out there. Just step up and take advantage of them. You can contact me if you're interested in running on either Bob or Dan's layouts, but don't stop there. Both the K&I and Southern Indiana clubs are up and running right now, so there are plenty of local opportunities as well, even if you just want to run some trains.



A Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight

Our recent little heat wave (my thermometer topped out the other day at an even 100 degrees) made me think of what it was like working on the railroad in the summer heat and, believe me, it wasn't fun or pleasant.

You never had a tree or an overpass handy where you could stop in the shade. A nice two or three hour wait while your engine cab was sitting out in the baking sun was not unheard of. Even if you opened both cab doors there had to be a breeze blowing before it did you any good. All you could do is sit there and bake. Sometimes, you could take a kerchief and wet it with some cold water and put it around your neck or on your head for a little relief but, that was about the best you could do.

If you were going out on the running boards to inspect your units you better have your gloves on because anything steel that had been sitting out in the sun would be hot enough to burn you if you held on to it for any length of time.

Of course, diesel units that had any engine cooling issues would act up in this kind of weather. A lot of the remaining depots would have water hoses you could use to get enough cooling water in the tank to get you - hopefully to the next terminal or, at least, last awhile longer until it pooped out.

The SP/SSW did start buying units with cab air conditioners mounted on the roof. If they worked (not always a given) they could turn cab into an ice box but, of course, you eventually would have to get out in the heat.

Eventually, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers did get an agreement with the railroad that if you had a unit with a working air conditioner it would be placed as the lead unit. That caused an issue with the mechanical forces at the old Rock Island facility at Amourdale in Kansas City. Rather than do anything inconvenient to re-arrange a consist they would drain the Freon out of a unit's air conditioner. Nice guys. I did know of a couple of guys who'd carry a couple cans of Freon in their grips along with a short charging hose and try and resuscitate weak air conditioners. They used the same Freon as automotive air conditioners and had the same charging fittings so, sometimes, it helped.

Physically, out on the railroad, a big issue in this kind of heat would be track pushed out of alignment or "sun-kinked" from uncontrolled expansion. They frequently use a water spray while laying continuous welded rail to try to bring it down to the average annual ambient temperature for the location where it's being laid. But, the real success in controlling expansion lay in using enough rail anchors. Sometimes, even with what was thought to be enough anchors, it happened. Since it seldom breaks the rails, the signal circuits won't detect them. Occasionally, engines and even entire trains can get over them but, more than once, they've caused fatal derailments.

And, when you have this kind of heat and humidity, a strong cold front can come along and dump torrential rains causing washouts. Although they cooled things off temporarily, eventually, the sun came back out and all they really served to do was keep the humidity at a sauna bath level. I don't miss it!
