For October, the 2024-2025 Charlie Keeling Hybrid Model Contest had three entries in the steam locomotives category. Everyone was a winner this time around!

## **FIRST PLACE:**

Above: Steve Lasher's HO New York Central 2-8-2

Steve built this model from a DJH (British) Models USRA 2-8-2 kit. The frame is two heavy brass etchings separated by brass spacers screwed in place. The boiler is a die-casting with lost wax detail parts added. The side rods are stainless steel photo-etchings. Added details include: low water alarm, correct NYC headlight, and repositioned generator correct for a NYC H-6. The tender is a Bachmann long USRA with added details including: extending the coal space, ATS equipment, poling pole, and rerailing frogs correct for NYC. A Soundtraxx Tsunami2 decoder was added with a sugar cube speaker in the tender.

## **SECOND PLACE:**

Above: Eric Waggoner's HO "NC&STL STEAM"

Eric described his model as "unmodified." He provided a description of the prototype: Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis 4-8-2 Mountain #553 steam locomotive stops briefly at a local station. The NC&StL received five USRA light Mountains from the American Locomotive Company in 1919. These locomotives were designated as Class J1-54 and assigned road numbers 550 through 554. They had 27 x 30 cylinders, 69" drivers, a boiler pressure of 200 psi, a tractive effort of 53,900 lbs. and weighed 327,000 pounds.

## **ACHIEVEMENT PROGRAM**

Welcome to the Matrix! No, this is not the SciFi thriller movie, though the series is fun to watch. Better still, it's not the matrices and matrix arithmetic you may have encountered in algebra. These matrices are the NMRA Guidelines that are used when evaluating your models. A link is provided on the Division 8 website. Click on the Achievement Program tab. At the very top of the page below my contact information is the link - <a href="https://www.nmra.org/sites/default/files/2006-judging-guide-lines.pdf">https://www.nmra.org/sites/default/files/2006-judging-guide-lines.pdf</a>. While not an action thriller, it clearly shows how evaluations are done. In essence, the matrix considers the complexity of the model and the quality of the workmanship. As an example, I constructed an outhouse from a <sup>3</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" x <sup>3</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" balsa stick in 30 minutes. The top was angled for the rain to run off. Corrugated metal was glued to the top. The door was etched in with an x-acto knife. The wood was stained and a some weathering powder applied. Complexity 1, worksmanship 14. Score 15. It serves its purpose as a background structure. The 'scene' was the boxcar project Fred Soward gave us. The foreground model was far more complex but was never evaluated. Granted, the matrix is not a titillating thriller. It does clarify the process. Looking forward to seeing the amazing work everyone does!

In his October Pie Card article about the Little River Railroad Museum in Townsend, TN, Fred Soward asked, "Anyone know what this is? I don't. Bob Dawson doesn't. Neither did the person on duty in the museum gift shop."

Steve Lasher stepped up to the challenge and provided this answer: "I'd say it's the pattern for a rear cylinder head on a steam locomotive. You're looking at what would be the inside of it, and the hole in the middle is where the piston rod packing gland would go. That's my guess, anyway."




Fred ran three different trains during the operating session on Ron King's layout. As you can see, it gets a little bit tight in some areas of the layout.
